

09:00 Meet your English-speaking guide in the hotel lobby and commence sightseeing by private vehicle.

Located in the center of Tokyo, encircled by stone walls, stately trees and moats, the Imperial Palace Plaza is where the Emperor of Japan resides. Today, much of the palace grounds is closed to the public.

Enjoy the bustle of Tokyo's Tsukiji Fish Market outer section, where over 2,000 tons of fresh marine produce are received daily.

Japan's most beloved sport, "sumo" (meaning striking one another) is a full-contact activity where the "rikishi" (wrestler) tries to force his opponent out of the "Dohyo" (wrestling ring) or into touching the ground. Enjoy a comprehensive briefing about sumo and the wrestler's daily life followed by some demonstrations by retired sumo champions (**private basis**). This culminates in a traditional meal of "Chankonabe" the hearty stew eaten by wrestlers in order to help them bulk up.

Built in 645 AD, Asakusa Kannon Temple is Tokyo's oldest temple and one of its most venerated. Legend tells of two fishermen netting a statue of Kannon, the goddess of mercy, prompting their village leader to erect a temple in her honor. It has attracted countless worshippers since, from shoguns and samurais to modern-day tourists. Approach the temple via Nakamise shopping street, a marketplace serving up authentic souvenirs and seasonal snacks since the early 18th century.

End your day with a walking tour in the Ginza – which is the most exclusive and expensive shopping area in Japan. It is also known for having the most expensive real estate on earth. The streets are



lined with neon signs, department stores, boutiques, bars and restaurants. The name Ginza comes from "silver mint" which the Shogun built in the area in 1612. Japan, by choice, was a secluded country for over two hundred years. In 1860 they opened to foreign trade and the Ginza is where western architecture and imports were first displayed.

You will also visit a Depachika food floor at one of the department stores. In Japanese department stores, the basement floor is a foodstuff market area. These areas go by the nickname "depachika" (a combination of "depato", meaning department store, and "chika", meaning basement). The "depachika" of Japan are fun places, kind of like "food theme parks". The selections in these markets can be broken up into two categories: an area featuring everyday delicatessen style items and an area featuring snacks and treats. And vegetables and fish are also sold at the perishable goods market area.

Following your sightseeing return to your hotel arriving at 17:00.

09:00 Meet your English-speaking guide in the hotel lobby and commence sightseeing by private vehicle.

Erected in 1920 amidst a peaceful forest, the Meiji Shrine is dedicated to the deified spirits of Emperor Meiji, the first emperor of modern Japan, and his consort, Empress Shoken. Consisting of three areas - Naien, the main shrine buildings; Gaien, the outer precinct including the Meiji Memorial Picture Gallery and sports facilities; and the Meiji Memorial Hall - it offers a serene setting for wedding processions as well as Shinto blessing rituals and purification rites.

Harajuku began attracting visitors worldwide during the 1964 Tokyo Olympics, its proximity to the Olympic village offering the prospect of sighting famous athletes. Since then, it has seen a proliferation of international as well as local fashion and lifestyle brands, emerging as a cradle of Japanese youth cultures and trends.

In Omotesando, fashion designers began to set up their offices and studios after the Tokyo Olympics in 1964. Since then, more and more fashion stores for adults and fashionable coffee shops and restaurants have been built in this area.

Enjoy lunch at a local restaurant (payable locally).

Mori Art Museum – Setting the standard for a new kind of public institution, the Mori Museum has an open attitude toward contemporary art and culture. Their aim is to inspire visitors by showing art in new ways and frameworks through an accessible program of exhibitions, public events and research projects. This will provide an international platform for emerging and established artists and designers throughout Japan and the world. The Mori Museum firmly believes that art and culture are the true expressions of our times and that quality in art and life hold importance to us all. At the base of the tower is French-American artist and sculptor Louise Bourgeois's Maman, a giant bronze and marble spider straddling the courtyard. Then move on to the Tokyo City View observation deck on the 52nd floor of the tower, 250 meters above ground, which is the city's highest viewpoint.



Aoyama Square is a kind of a traditional crafts showroom run by The Association for the Promotion of Traditional Craft Industries, recognized by the Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry of Japan, and they exhibit and sell more than 100 different kinds of traditionally crafted products. Traditional handicrafts made by using local materials and traditional techniques are an important part of the Japanese culture. There is pottery, lacquer and glass ware, wooden crafts, products made from bamboo and kimono textiles from different parts of Japan.

In the evening, set off on a foodie tour that promises fun and food in equal portions. Start in Shinjuku, Tokyo's bustling nighttime capital sampling and savoring the flavors in Kabukicho, the once notorious red-light district that today welcomes all. Try the local fare served up in an izakaya, pubstyle eateries loved by the after-hours office crowd. Clients can opt to make an offering at the historic Hanazono Shrine which, surrounded by neon lights and glittering nightclubs, remains a popular place of petition for local entrepreneurs. Your guide saves the best for last when you arrive at Golden Gai, chock-a-block with tiny beer joints, whiskey bars and clubs once the heart of Tokyo's post WW II black market. Here you raise a glass or two toasting the colorful world of Tokyo's foodie fun – and best of all the first two are on you guide.

Afterwards return to your hotel arriving at 20:00.

08:00 Meet your English-speaking guide in the hotel lobby and commence sightseeing by private vehicle.

Your first highlight is Toshogu Shrine at the entrance to Nikko National Park. This spectacular complex is the resting place of Tokugawa leyasu, the founder of the Tokugawa Shogunate that ruled Japan for 250 years until 1868. Most of the buildings here are designated as national treasures or Important Cultural Properties. The lavishly decorated shrine comprises over a dozen buildings set in a beautiful forest. Marvel at the abundance of gold leaf and countless intricately carved motifs. Seek out the most famous carvings, such as the see no evil, speak no evil and hear no evil monkeys and the Sozonozo elephants.

Next, be prepared for the hair-raising drive to exquisite Lake Chuzenji. Your private vehicle travels along Irohazaka, one of two serpentine mountain roads that together consist of 48 hairpin bends.

Enjoy lunch at a local restaurant (payable locally).

After a short drive, arrive at Kegon Waterfall. At 97 meters (318 feet) in height, it is one of Japan's three great waterfalls. Take the elevator to the observation platform at the base of the waterfall to fully appreciate its enormity. Look out for monkeys in the surrounding forest.

Following your sightseeing transfer back to your hotel in Tokyo by private vehicle arriving at 18:00.

08:30 Please meet your guide in the hotel lobby and transfer overland to Hakone in the foothills of Mount Fuji by private vehicle.

Part of the Fuji-Hakone-Izu National Park, Hakone is celebrated for its hot springs, magnificent natural beauty and a wealth of outdoor activities for the visitor. It is also the single best place to view Mount Fuji in all its majestic wonder. Among the many sights is the Hakone Open-Air Museum, one of the world's finest outdoor sculpture gardens. Visitors to Tokyo should include a day or two in Hakone to experience Japan's wonderful onsen (hot springs) culture.

Blending seminal artworks with the region's natural beauty, The Hakone Open-Air Museum is home to hundreds of modern and contemporary masterpieces. Sculptures from the likes of Rodin, Moore and other masters are scattered throughout the sprawling 17-acre compound. Additionally, there are four indoor exhibition halls, including the Picasso Pavilion, which houses over 300 of his creations.

Then you will visit Owakudani - the area around a crater created in the last eruption of Mount Hakone 3000 years ago offering unrivalled views of Mount Fuji. The area has many sulfurous fumes, hot springs and hot rivers and eggs, boiled in the naturally hot waters, are said to prolong one's life by seven years. These eggs can be purchased in the area.

Proceed to Lake Ashi, one of the principle attractions of Hakone. Created by volcanic activity, it lies at approximately 2,380 feet above sea level. Enjoy a boat cruise (shared basis) on the picturesque lake, framed by the mountain landscape.

Onshi Hakone Park which is a beautiful park located on the side of Lake Ashi. It is built on the small peninsula. It has a great view of Mt. Fuji and Lake Ashi. The park was constructed as the summer resort palace for the imperial family in Meiji era. After World War II, it was given to Kanagawa prefecture.

After sightseeing, you will be transferred back to your ryokan to check in at 1700.

09:00 Please meet your English-speaking guide in the hotel lobby and commence a full day sightseeing to Arakurayama Sengen, Arakura Fuji Sengen Taisha Shrine and Oshino Hakkai by private vehicle.

First visit to Arakurayama Sengen Park and Arakura Fuji Sengen Taisha Shrine - This scenic park located on the mountainside of Mt. Arakura and in front of Mount Fuji, offers a panoramic view of the city. When you reach the park level, and there is a famous pagoda there. This pagoda is called the Chureitou and is a five-storied pagoda. It was built in 1963 as a peace memorial. The pagoda is an especially popular place to photograph during the cherry blossom season and the autumn color season

Enjoy lunch at a local restaurant (payable locally).

Oshino Hakkai is a touristy set of eight ponds in Oshino, a small village in the Fuji Five Lake region, located between Lake Kawaguchiko and Lake Yamanakako on the site of a former sixth lake that dried out several hundred years ago. The eight ponds are fed by snow melt from the slopes of nearby Mount Fuji that filters down the mountain through porous layers of lava for over 80 years, resulting in very clear spring water that is revered by the locals.

Upon arrival Takayama, meet with your guide and commence a half day tour by private vehicle with your guide (1418-1730):

Nestled in the foothills of the Japanese Alps charming Takayama is a quaint mountain town steeped in historic tradition. For visitors this is a living museum of old Japan with is narrow lanes, wooden shops, houses and sake breweries. Enjoy exploring this delightful treasure trove of tradition especially during its spring and autumn festivals. Visitors can also take a day trip to Shirakawago a UNESCO World Heritage site famous for its 16th homesteads.

Takayama Jinya Manor House is located in the old town near the Nakabashi Bridge. Because of its valuable timber resources, the Hida Region around Takayama was put under direct control of the Tokugawa Shogunate in 1692. The Takayama Jinya served as the local government office headed



by the officials dispatched from Edo (present day Tokyo). The building complex was in official use until 1969, and is now open to the public as a museum.

During spring and autumn, brightly colored floats flood the streets of Takayama to welcome the changing of the season. The Takayama Yatai Kaikan (Takayama Float Festival Exhibition Hall) exhibits several of these floats, allowing those who are unable to witness the fanfare firsthand an up-close look at these festive creations, each diversely decorated to reflect the traditions of its home district.

Take a walk back in time through the Sanmachi Quarter, one of the most immaculately preserved Edo-era neighborhoods in Japan. These old merchant houses, packed into three narrow streets—Ichi-no-Machi, Ni-no-Machi and San-no-Machi—now serve as restaurants, shops, museums and sake breweries, many of which have been operational for centuries.

After sightseeing, you will be transferred back to your hotel to check-in at around 1730.

09:00 Meet your English-speaking guide in the hotel lobby and transfer overland from Takayama to Kanazawa by private vehicle. You will make one stop on this transfer in the beautiful village of Shirakawa which is located in the Ono District of Gifu Prefecture.

Set at the southern end of the Noto Peninsula along the coast of the Sea of Japan, Kanazawa is called, "Japan's best kept travel secret". Authentically Japanese, without over commercial or western influences, the city is home to one of the three most beautiful classical gardens, a historic samurai quarter, a traditional geisha district and a number of elegant handicraft workshops.

The village area is located 48 kilometers (30 miles) to the west of Takayama and the drive takes about 50 minutes. After arriving in the Shirakawa area you first visit the scenic lookout which affords panoramic views across the valley floor.

The village is situated in the Ryohaku Mountains with the highest point in the area Mount Hakusan at 2,172 meters (7,125 feet). The mountain setting influences the climate of the region with the village recording an average of 10 meters (415 inches) of snow each winter making this one of the snowiest places in Japan.

The village has a long history dating back to the Edo period (1603 - 1868) and is one of the only areas left in central Honshu where the distinctive gassho-zukuri style of architecture can be found. The steep sloped thatched roofs provide protection from the heavy winter snowfalls. The village is now an invested UNESCO World Heritage Site and the local economy is dependent on the seasonal tourism that this designation has brought. Summer are particularly busy and there is now some concern about the village being impacted by the growing number of tourists.

Enjoy the balance of the day exploring the village which includes visits to selected houses to learn about the life of the villagers.

You will continue your overland transfer to Kanazawa where, on arrival, you are taken to your lovely hotel arriving at 17:00.

09:00 Meet your English-speaking guide in the hotel lobby and commence sightseeing by private vehicle.

Begin with a walk through the Nagamachi District, the former samurai district which flourished during the Edo period (1603 - 1868) when the powerful Tokugawa shogunate dominated Japan. The Nagamachi area is a mirror to the traditions of samurai life and through the meticulous restoration done on this area visitors can better appreciate this rich chapter of Japanese history.

Then visit the highly regarded 21st Century Museum of Contemporary Art which is regarded as the finest museum of contemporary art in Japan. Opened in 2004 the collection is commissioned by the museum and features work produced since 1980. Each piece commissioned should adhere to the philosophy of the museum's vision: to produce works that propose new values.

Enjoy lunch at a local restaurant (payable locally).

Next visit the Kenrokuen Garden considered one of the three finest ""classical"" gardens in all of Japan. The garden, which is located to the southwest of Kanazawa Castle, was begun in 1676 and

restored again in 1759. It covers an area of 114,436 square meters (25 acres) and includes 8,750 trees and plants representing 183 different species. The highlight of this visit is the Seisonkaku Villa a beautiful Samurai home located in the southwest corner of the garden.

Continue with your orientation making a stop to explore the Higashichaya District which is the largest of three Teahouse areas in the city. These are also the traditional geisha districts dating to the Edo period (1603 - 1868) and which continue to flourish today.

You will also make a stop at a traditional miso paste shop.

Following your sightseeing return to your hotel arriving at 17:00.

If Tokyo suggests the future then Kyoto is the heart of historic Japan, a city steeped in imperial heritage and deeply rooted in classical Japanese tradition. Serving as the capital of imperial Japan from 794 to 1868 it is famous for its cultural treasures: temples, gardens, shrines, and the intangible philosophy of an ancient way of life. For visitors the city features the greatest concentration of Japanese history and culture; a repository of the cultural treasures for which Japan is celebrated.

Visit to Nishiki Market, a thriving market that came into being in the early 17th Century. Extending about 400 meters east to west, the market is lined with shops selling mainly fish, Kyoto vegetables, bean curd products, dried goods, pickles, ready-prepared side dishes, indeed any kind of food that might be required for Kyoryori traditional cuisine.

Enjoy lunch at a local restaurant (payable locally).

Start your discovery of Kyoto at a UNESCO World Heritage Site, the superb Kiyomizu temple. According to legend, the priest Enchin erected a hermitage and small chapel here in 788. From the temple's lofty platform, enjoy a panoramic view of Kyoto. Note that both the main hall and the platform were built without the use of nails or joiners.

From Kiyomizu, stroll down into Gojazaka, one of a number of nearby lanes that retain the charm of a bygone era. Gojazaka is known for its many Kiyomizu pottery studios. Typical Kyoto souvenirs such as sweets and pickles are also available.

Don a traditional kimono and take part in the ancient rite of the "Chado" or tea ceremony in this engaging hands on experience. The afternoon private experience is held in a traditional machiya or town house and led by expert tea masters. You will first be fitted and properly dressed in a traditional kimono which literally means, "Thing to Wear". The kimono is the national costume of Japan and is worn on many special festive occasions. After being dressed in the kimono take part in the traditions of the tea ceremony which is deeply influenced by the philosophy of Zen Buddhism. The tea master will carefully explain the significance of the ceremony and how it expresses the importance of coming together in a chance meeting.

End the day with a leisurely amble through the quaint alleyways of Gion, a famed geisha district lined with bars, restaurants and teahouses sporting old-style wooden facades. You may catch sight of a geisha or a maiko as she flits between her lessons and evening appointments.

After sightseeing, you will be transferred to your hotel to check-in around 1800.

feeding sites.

The one-hour drive brings you to the old capital of Nara. Your first stop is Nara Park. This expansive estate is home to over 1,000 freely roaming deer. Considered in Shintoism as messengers of the gods, the deer relish the crackers on sale around the park.

Then head to Todaiji, a temple founded in 752 and home to Daibutsu, or Great Buddha, the world's largest bronze casting. Marvel at the size of the Buddha's open hand, which alone is the height of human, and at Daibutsuden, which houses the statue. It is believed to be the largest wooden structure on earth.

Return to Shintoism at Kasuga Taisha, a shrine built in 768 and reconstructed every 20 years thereafter. Try to envisage the 3,000 stone and bronze lanterns when they are lit on 3rd or 5th February and 15th August each year.

Following your sightseeing return to your hotel arriving at 17:00.

Begin your day in Hiroshima at the Peace Memorial Park and Peace Memorial Museum.

The 120,000-square-meter park was once the commercial and political heart of the city. Spend some time strolling the many paths before entering the Peace Memorial Museum.

The museum focuses on the events of 6th August, 1945, the day the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima. You may find the personal details displayed upsetting.

Walk from the museum to the A-Bomb Dome, stopping briefly to view the Cenotaph for the A-Bomb Victims. The A-Bomb Dome was one of the few buildings in Hiroshima to remain standing after the bombing. Today it is a UNESCO World Heritage site.

Transfer from the city of Hiroshima to the Miyajimaguchi pier by private vehicle and board the public ferry for Miyajima, a small island and Shinto holy site.

Enjoy lunch at a local restaurant (payable locally).

Begin your walking tour of the island. Visit the delightful Itsukushima Shrine, which is located in a small inlet and is yet another UNESCO World Heritage site. Look out over Seto Inland Sea to see the shrine's famous torii gate. If the tide is high you will understand why it is known as the "Floating Torii Gate."

Following your sightseeing return to Hiroshima Train station by public ferry and private vehicle. (No A&K assistant to accompany clients during this train journey)

Move onto one of the busiest streets in Osaka for a great shopping experience on the famous Shinsaibashi Shopping Street, the 580-meter-long arcade still attracts throngs of people with its variety of department stores, trendy shops and cafes, and recreational facilities as well as the beloved long-standing establishments.

You end the day exploring the vibrant Dotonburi district named after the canal which runs along one part of the area. First developed in 1612, Dotonburi was a major entertainment center with theaters, performance venues and performers of all type gathering to meet in the area. You will enjoy one of the highlights of any visit to Dotonburi - sampling the snack food wonders of the district which is called "the heart of Osaka's" food culture.

Following your visit return to your hotel in Kyoto arriving at 17:00.

COUNTRY INFORMATION, FACTS & ADVICE

Japan

One of the greatest success stories of the 20th century, Japan is a country that defies easy categorization. It has the world's third largest economy (after the United States and China) and is at the forefront of many hi-tech industries, yet at the same time, remains deeply tied to time-honored traditions. Its society, almost painfully slow to adapt to changes, observes conformity to national order not seen in many other nations. It is also a country of varied natural beauty steeped in history and cultural achievements that make it one of the most appealing of travel destinations.

While the boom times of the 1980s and early 1990s have since disappeared, the Japanese economy suffers from a pernicious stagnation that threatens to derail its post War growth achievements which, nevertheless, remain a model of economic development that is the envy of most other nations. What the 21st century holds for Japan is anyone's guess but it is certain Japan will become an important broker in Asian affairs, a bridge between the developed and developing worlds – a force for peace and reconciliation.

Getting into Japan

Nationals of the United States visiting Japan require a valid passport (valid for at least six months after the date of their departure from country) and a return airline ticket. US citizens do not require an entry visa for Japan. Visitors are granted tourist visas on arrival valid for stays of 90 days or less. Travelers from other countries should consult the Japanese embassy in their country for the latest travel requirements.

Keeping Healthy in Japan

If you take prescription medication, please ensure you have sufficient medication for the duration of your trip.

While Japan is a wealthy and highly developed nation it should be noted that outside of major cities (including Tokyo, Osaka, Yokohama, Kobe, Sapporo, Nagoya, Nagasaki, Hiroshima and Kyoto) medical facilities serving or catering to foreign visitors are limited. There are no required vaccinations for Japan but travelers should inquire (with their personal physician or through a medical information service like the CDC) about vaccinations against hepatitis B, influenza and Japanese encephalitis.

When preparing for your trip it is strongly recommended that you prepare a personal travel medical kit that would include the following items: Aspirin, lomotil, laxative, Band-Aid, antiseptic ointment, mosquito repellent, cold medicine, antihistamine cream, throat lozenges, wet tissues and hand soap.



We do recommend that you take out comprehensive travel insurance to cover you in the event of a medical emergency.

Tipping

Tipping is a very personal matter and is discretionary. If you feel that your guide and your driver have been helpful and gone above and beyond helping you then a monetary gratuity is welcomed and an acknowledgement of the service extended. 

Weather



What to Pack

Japan, especially in the cities, is a style conscious country and you should pack more stylish wear when visiting the country. Still traditionally modest, the Japanese, however, appreciate good clothing and tend to look down at more casual attire.



Travelers to Japan should pay attention to the weather conditions and the time of year when they plan to visit the country.

Spring and autumn visitors will need to bring clothing suitable for both summery conditions and the sudden outbreak of colder conditions. For summer visits cool, breathable fabrics like cottons and linens are recommended. For winter visitors you will need to pack warm woolens, a heavy winter coat or ski jacket, hat, gloves and a scarf when visiting northern Honshu and Hokkaido.

Please note that you should bring whatever you require with you, as clothing is expensive in Japan. In addition sizing can be a problem for travelers from North America and Europe as Japanese are smaller people and larger sizes, therefore, harder to find.

If you wear glasses or contact lenses you should carry an additional pair (or set) with you (as both are expensive in Japan). The voltage used throughout Japan is uniformly 100 Volt AC.

Lighters and matches are not allowed to be brought onto aeroplanes, neither in check-in nor hand carried luggage. Our guides are happy to assist guests to access lighters or matches when travelling on the ground. If the above are found, the security officers have the right to confiscate the items.

Power packs, cell phone and computer batteries are not allowed to be brought on aeroplanes in the checked in luggage. They can only be brought on the plane in hand carried luggage. Specifications of the power pack must be labelled on the power pack. If the above are found, the security officers have the right to confiscate the items.

Religion & Etiquette

Buddhism (of the Mahayana sect) and Shinto are the two most popular forms of religion in Japan.

Most Buddhists also observe Shinto (and vice versa). Buddhism came to Japan via Korea and China in the 6th century.

Zen, one of the most popular sects in Japan, reached the country from China in the 12th century (in China it is called "chan"). Its emphasis on meditation and self-discipline appealed to Japan's shogunate and became the religious practice among this class of warriors.

There are also *shinko shukyo* or new religions – cult like groups – that are now making some inroad with the younger population of the country.

Japan is a country, which values manners, and there are set forms of behaviour tied to the country's cultural history.

Abercrombie & Kent

The tenets of Confucian philosophy – deference to your elders, familial relations and a strict code of moral conduct – are entrenched in Japanese society.

Among traditional customs are bowing when greeting someone, exchanging business cards, removing one's shoes when entering a home and never staring directly at someone.

As a foreigner you are exempt – to a degree – from strict observance of these social mores but it does help to try and fit in.

Money

The Japanese Yen, like the US Dollar, is one of the most important of world currencies. Its fluid exchange relationship with the US Dollar is closely observed and is considered one of the barometers of the global economic climate.

The Yen is divided into 100 Sen and 1,000 Rin (these two denominational units are no longer in use but are still used by currency traders and banks for official rate calculations).

Today the Yen is minted in coins of 1, 5, 10, 50, 100 and 500 Yen. The Yen is printed in paper note values of 1,000; 2,000; 5,000; and 10,000 YEN.

The rate of exchange to the US dollar fluctuates and it is advised that you check exchange rates prior to your departure.

Currency can be exchanged at hotels and banks but note that your hotel will probably charge a commission or a rate less favorable than the official bank rate.

International credit cards (American Express, MasterCard, Visa and Diners Club) are widely accepted. However, credit card transactions are not always convenient outside big cities and therefore, obtaining cash beforehand is recommended when you travel to the countryside.

Banking hours in Japan are Monday – Friday from 9:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. (banks are closed on Saturdays, Sundays and National Holidays).

Local Food & Drink

Japanese cuisine is rich in tradition and guided both by the actual preparation and an observed code of etiquette.

Rice is the staple grain and all meals usually include rice – either steamed white rice or fried rice. Seafood is also a prominent feature of Japanese cuisine due to its maritime location. Fish, especially exotic varieties is a highly prized food for Japanese gourmands.

Some typical Japanese entrees are tempura, sukiyaki, domburi, okonomiyaki, sushi and sashimi.

The most popular Japanese beverage is 'sake' a clear rice wine which is served warm in small decorative bottles. Beer is also widely available along with soft drinks and bottled waters. Wine is growing in popularity and there are now wine bars in larger cities like Tokyo and Osaka. Tea is an integral part of Japanese tradition and green tea is a Japanese specialty.

Shopping

Japan is a consumer society and shopping is a favorite past time of young people. As the society is rooted in a strict observance of courtesy and social behavior, gift giving is important (hence the need to shop).

Department stores are open from Monday to Friday from 10am – 6pm and from 10am – 6:30pm on Saturdays and Sundays. All department stores will close one day of the week (this is not uniform and the closing day varies). Smaller shops will observe different hours, often staying open until later in the evening.

Prices for all goods are expensive in Japan so if you are interested in shopping that should be an accepted fact. Japan has a highly refined tradition of arts and crafts and there are many exquisite items to consider like pottery, painting, lacquer work and carvings.



21.2 In the event of a cancellation or material alteration to the trip as a result of the circumstances as described in this clause A&K may in their sole and absolute discretion:

a) offer the traveller(s) alternative travel arrangements or products of

comparable standard as may be appropriate in the circumstances; or

b) if alternative travel arrangements or products are not offered by A&K, A&K will make a prompt proportional refund of monies paid by the traveller.

All claims for days missed while travelling should be made in writing within 30 days of the program. 26. TRAVELLERS' REPRESENTATIONS:

If you or any member of your party has any medical problem or disability which may affect your stay, please provide us with full details before we confirm your booking so that we can try to advise you as to the suitability of your chosen arrangements. We may require you to produce a doctor's certificate certifying that you are fit to participate in the tour. Acting reasonably, if we are unable to properly accommodate the needs of the person(s) concerned, we will not confirm your booking or if you did not give us full details at the time of booking, we will cancel it and impose applicable cancellation charges when we become aware of these details.

27. AIR TRANSPORTATION:
